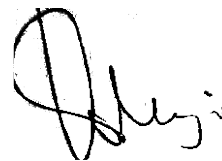
We look forward to substantial physical expansion of our Schools' facilities; which have become an impossibility in our current location. This calls for thinking outside the box. May Allah make it easy.

## REPORT OF THE AUDITORS TO THE MEMBERS OF LEKKI MUSLIM UMMAH

### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of **Lekki Muslim Ummah** ("the Organisation") which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2024 and the statements of financial activities, changes in funds, and cash flows for the year then ended and notes to the financial statements including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of **Lekki Muslim Ummah** as at 31 December 2024 and of its financial activities and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the Companies and Allied Matters Act, 2020 and in compliance with the Financial Reporting Council of Nigeria (Amendment) Act, 2023 and the International Financial Reporting Standards.

### Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the Organisation in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (Parts A and B) (IESBA Code) and other independence requirements applicable to performing audits of financial statements in Nigeria. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express an audit opinion or any form of assurance conclusion thereon. In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially consistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

# Independent Auditor's Report

- if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our audit report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Organisation to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

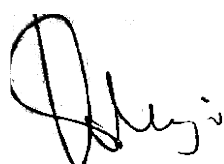

# Notes to the Financial Statements

## 1 General information

These financial statements are the financial statements of Lekki Muslim Ummah (LEMU). LEMU (the "Company") was incorporated in Nigeria under the Companies and Allied Matters Act in 2002. The registered address of the Company is 9 Hakeem Dickson Link Rd, Lekki Phase I, Lagos.

## 2 Summary of significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

### 2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of LEMU have been prepared in compliance with the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) for SMEs issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the company's accounting policies.

### 2.2 Going concern

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the company's ability to continue as a going concern. Accordingly, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

### 2.3 Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in thousands of Naira, which is also the company's functional currency.

### 2.4 Donations and member contribution

This comprises all incoming resources from donations from the general public and income from annual dues, maintenance levies and similar levies from the members of the organisation.

### 2.5 Other income

This comprises income generated by the organisation from its academic divisions (LMS, Madrasa and Tahfeez), Itikaf programme and hall rental etc

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, excluding rebates. The company assesses its revenue arrangements against specific criteria to determine if it is acting as principal or agent. The Company has concluded that it is acting as a principal in all of its revenue arrangements. The following specific recognition criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

- Termly fee is recognised over the term in a systematic manner
- Other operating income is recognised as it accrues

### 2.6 Property plant and equipment

Except for items costing below N100,000 which are expensed on acquisition, all expenditure of a capital nature is capitalised.

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets, less their residual values, over their expected useful lives using the straight-line basis.

# Notes to the **Financial Statements**

## **2.6 Property plant and equipment (continued)**

The expected useful lives of the assets to the business are reassessed periodically in the light of experience.

Freehold buildings over 50 years straight-line basis  
Office equipment over four years straight-line basis  
Furniture and fittings over five years straight-line basis  
Plant and equipment over five years straight-line basis

## **2.7 Financial instruments**

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value.

## **2.8 Cash and cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks.

## **2.9 Borrowings**

Borrowings are recognised initially at fair value, net of transaction costs incurred. Borrowings are subsequently stated at amortised cost; any differences between proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the redemption value is recognised in statement of financial activities over the period of the borrowings.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the Company has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the end of the reporting period.

## **2.10 Creditors and provisions**

Creditors and provisions are recognised where there is a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

## **2.11 Employee benefits**

A defined contribution plan is a post-employment benefit plan (pension fund) under which the Company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. The Company has no legal or constructive obligations to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employees the benefits relating to employees' service in the current and prior periods.

In line with the provisions of the Pension Reform Act 2014, the Company has instituted a defined contribution pension scheme for its permanent staff. Employees contribute 8% each of their basic salary, transport and housing allowances to the Fund on a monthly basis. The Company's contribution is 10% of each employee's basic salary, transport and housing allowances. Staff contributions to the scheme are funded through payroll deductions while the Company's contribution is recognised in profit and loss as employee benefit expense in the periods during which services are rendered by employees.

## **2.12 Taxation**

The company is exempt from taxation of its income and gains to the extent they fall within the exemptions in Section 23(1) of the Companies Income Tax Act (CITA) Cap C21 LFN 2004 (as amended).

**Property Management** - The committee is charges with the maintenance of the structures and premises. The Committee also responsible to structural development.

**Other** - The mosque management including the other committees such as women forum, youth wing, security management committee etc.

# Da'wah Committee Report



In the period under review, the Da'wah Committee sustained her Dawah activities and recorded significant achievements as the flagship of LEMU. Owing to proactive and efficacious Da'wah programmes, our mosque has maintained her status as the model mosque in Lagos State. Some of the achievements during the year under review are as follows:

## 1 LEMU Annual Imams Conference

Our Annual Imams Conference which is held on every May Day (Workers Day) is a capacity-building conference aimed at re-orientating Imams and scholars, and encouraging the preaching of pristine Islam.

The sixth editions was held in the period under review. The theme was 'IMAMS, THE YOUTHS AND THE LAW'. More than 400 imams participated which stood out as the second most attended since the take-off of the conference. The disconnect between Islamic preachers and the youth was addressed, while solutions were offered.

## 2 LEMU Quarterly Teenagers' Forum

In collaboration with the Madrasa management, LEMU Teenagers' Forum was established a few years back. The objective of the program is to bring together madrasa grown-ups and their mates in the neighbourhood for fellowship and to have access to speakers other than their regular teachers to discuss matters that affect that demography. the forum is meant to be held quarterly, while an elaborate one takes place one a year. The last one held October 27, 2024 with the theme: 'The Heart of a Muslim'. The plan was to have the Youth Committee of LEMU to steer the program but that has not happened yet.

## 3 Quarterly Da'wah Workshops

Between January 2024 and now, we have held four Quarterly Da'wah Workshops. One was held on Sunday January 14, 2024, with the theme "Towards a Happy Marriage". Another one was held on August 25, 2024, with the theme "Will and Inheritance". On December 1, 2024, another workshop with the theme "Polygamy" was held. In Ramadan, Sunday March 9, another workshop was held with the theme: 'Poverty Alleviation: The Role of Islamic Philanthropy'. Each of the workshops was attended by an average of 270 people.



## 4 LEMU Singles Forum/Match-making Programme

The LEMU Singles Forum/Match-making Programme aimed at facilitating suitable Muslim suitors for eligible spinsters and bachelors has continued to wax stronger. Te effort has yielded positive results. There are indications that the match-making efforts made in the year under review would soon yield more positive results.

In view of the growing difficulty being faced by youths in getting suitable spouses, the forum will now be held quarterly.

## 5. Counselling

Counselling goes on a daily basis between Asr and Maghrib or at specially appointed times. It has been observed that marital discords and other family conflicts bothering on inheritance, siblings' rivalry, business dealings, etc, have been on the increase in recent times. Similarly, cases of depression, drug addiction, and other issues that require psychotherapy have been on the increase.

In view of this development, efforts will be made to create more time for counselling. Known clinical psychologists will also be drafted in when necessary.

## 6. Sunday Tazkhirah

Tazkhirah is a weekly Fiqh forum held every Sunday. Tazkhirah sessions were held both virtually and physically throughout in the period under review. ## 7. Friday Tafsir

This is a forum for the exegeses of the Qur'an on Fridays. The session is held between Magrib and Isha every Friday. It is always well attended especially by Tahfeez College students.

## 8. Biannual Youth Da'wah and Leadership Training Camp

The Youth Da'wah and Leadership Training Camp is a new programme targeted at youths who are professionals. It will be held twice in a year during the Easter and Christmas holidays. Just forty youths, comprising 20 ladies and 20 men will be on camp for the one-day non-residential training programme that will be

## 9. Electronic Da'wah Board

We proposed that an electronic Da'wah Board be installed near the current Notice Board. Inspirational Islamic messages and useful information will be displayed on the board. This has been achieved in collaboration with the Zakat committee.

## 10. New Muslims

# Property Management Committee Report



## PREAMBLE

The 6 - members Property Management Committee ensures the Management, Maintenance and Improvements of LEMU properties which consists of the following buildings/space namely;

- Main Masjid with adjoining Library, Triangular Hall and Administrative Offices,
- Nursery & Primary School atop an Event Hall
- Admiral Ayinla Event Hall
- Accommodation Flats and Rooms
- Qur'an Memorization College.
- Ghosl Bay
- Open Spaces (Children Playground, Parking Spaces, etc)

Total land area occupied by the above listed buildings and space measures 1.006 Hectares with the Municipal address being 81A, Hakeem Dickson Street, Lekki Phase 1. Lagos.

## OBJECTIVES

The objective of this report is to highlight the activities of the Property Management Committee in ensuring a permanent suitability and tenantable condition of the premises for all and sundry. In ensuring perpetual availability of all the facilities in LEMU premises, the PMC works round the clock to deliver a state-of-the-art facility maintenance at affordable cost to the Ummah.

Some of the objectives of the Property Management Committee includes, but are not limited, to the following;

1. Ensure all the properties are maintained in a tenant-able condition.
2. Carry out regular inspection for faults and/damages and effect necessary repairs promptly
3. Identify ways and manners to constantly improve the overall value of the assets

4. Provide professional advice to the EXCO on best practices to improve the asset value
5. Carry out renovation and maintenance work to keep all the units in good state
6. Explore ways and means to get value from some units in line with shariah principles.

In order to achieve the above objectives and more, several constructions, renovation and/or modification works are identified from time to time and are executed accordingly. A non-exhaustive list of such works is kept on a rolling basis and listed below.

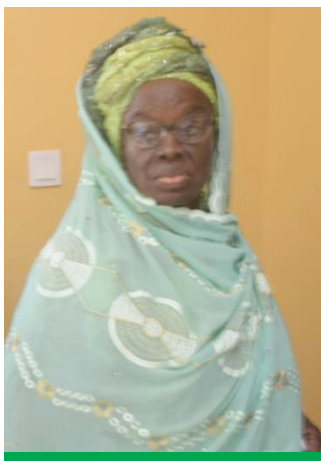

# Ramadan Committee Report



## INTRODUCTION

From the beginning to the end of the last Ramadan, we had a superlative performance which reverberated throughout the entire Lagos Muslim Community.

Our Ramadan programmes were adjudged by keen observers from within and outside the Lekki Muslim Ummah as excellently executed. Feelers from the 2025 Itikaaf participants also pointed in the same direction. Apparently, the resounding success we recorded was occasioned by the fresh ideas and initiatives we injected into our modus operandi.

## IFTAR FOR THE LESS-PRIVILEGED

We adopted a new strategy for the sharing of Iftar food for the less-privileged this time around, and the strategy proved quite efficacious. Prior to Ramadan, an Access Control Swivel was installed outside the mosque gate, near the food sharing point. The device forced the beneficiaries of the Iftar food to queue up and swirl orderly until each of them got to the food collection point, unlike in the past when queues were breached and the food sharing exercise became chaotic.

Another factor that accounted for the orderly food sharing process was the change we introduced in the timing of food distribution. Unlike in the past when the food sharing exercise began after the Maghrib prayer, it started at 5p.m. and ended shortly before the Maghrib prayer this time around.

Donors had earlier been enjoined to ensure that they brought in their foods latest by 5p.m each day.

The change in timing ensured that those in charge of food sharing finished up early enough to join the congregation for Maghrib prayer and perform other acts of Ibadah.

As usual, no fewer than one thousand less-privileged persons were fed each day of Ramadan, courtesy of kind-hearted donors who brought in various kinds of foods, fruits, water and soft drinks.

Notable among the donors was gentleman who donated 3,000 packs of food and 750 packs of bottled water (25 packs daily throughout Ramadan). Many NGOs also donated cooked and raw foods which were also shared to the less-privileged.

## FAMILY IFTAR

Again, our Family Iftar programme also assumed a new dimension and proportion during the last Ramadan.

The regular weekly Family Iftar we held in the past was changed to a once-in-Ramadan mega Iftar party, tagged Iftar With LEMU. It was a well attended grand banquet dinner held on Ramadan 19 at the Vice Admiral Jubrila Ayinla Multipurpose Hall. Apart from LEMU members, distinguished Muslims from outside the LEMU fold were also invited to the mega Iftar.

All the attendees at the Iftar With LEMU commended the elegant ambience, delicious meals and, more importantly, conviviality at the dinner. The Iftar party undoubtedly achieved its aim of a “family reunion”, as it attracted not only the members of LEMU Board of Trustee and Executive Council, but also members from all the social strata of our organisation.

## ITIKAAF

Going by sterling mien displayed by the Itikaaf participants throughout the spiritual retreat, and their positive feedback after the exercise, it wouldn't be out of place to adjudge this year's Itikaaf as the best ever. In the survey conducted on the Itikaaf, an overwhelming majority of participants corroborated our initial view that the organisation of the spiritual retreat was excellent.

A total of 114 participants registered for the Itikaaf while only 111 people participated in the exercise eventually.

Three people who had earlier registered couldn't participate for some understandable personal reasons, and they were appropriately refunded.

The 111 eventual participants comprised 77 men and 34 ladies.

## ITIKAAF REGISTRATION

The Itikaaf registration process was hitch-free. Both online payment and direct electronic money transfers into the Ramadan Committee's bank account were simultaneously deployed.

## RECEPTION

Participants were received with utmost courtesy when they reported to camp, except one or two of them who reported that they were harassed by some overzealous security guards at the mosque gate. While the Admin Manager received male participants, Alhaja Olajide received the female ones.

## ITIKAAF FEEDING

This time around, we were able to get another catering firm to provide Itikaaf catering services along with Labule Foods which had been only firm providing the services over the last four years.

A Tender Notice for the catering services was advertised online shortly before Ramadan and K.B.M.S Caterers emerged top among the pre-qualified firms and was engaged to provide the Itikaaf catering services along with Labule.

The engagement of the second caterer broke Labule's monopoly and afforded the Itikaaf participants more choices of meals during Iftar and Sahur.

It should be noted that participants were given one pack of bottled water each and varieties of fruits during the Itikaaf.

## ITIKAAF SUBSIDY

It should be noted that on Ramadan 21<sup>st</sup>, a kind-hearted Muslim paid the sum of N2.5 million to LEMU, to subsidise the N170,000 Itikaaf fee earlier charged each participant.

Following the payment, the President, Dr. AbdulGaniy Sola Labinjo immediately directed that the 96 participants who had paid the N170,000 fee as at then, should be refunded N25,000 each, while anybody paying for the Itikaaf afterwards should not pay more than N145,000. So, the 18 people who paid for the Itikaaf after the directive paid only N145,000 each.

## ITIKAAF CLINIC

A consultant Neurosurgeon with the Federal Medical Centre, Abeokuta, Dr. Liadi Tiamiyu who manned the clinic last year, also volunteered and manned the health facility again this year, in conjunction with a female Community Health Officer.

Essential drugs and materials were promptly restocked on resumption of the clinic, while clinic consultation hours were also announced and posted on the Notice Boards of the mosque.

A total of 27 patients (19 males, 8 females) received detailed documented clinical assessments, diagnosis and treatment, while numerous others received medical advice and guidance without documentation (an estimated 70 formal consultation from Staff and Itikaaf participants).

The most common ailment treated was Upper Respiratory Tract infection (6), followed by Malaria (3), hypertension (2), Peptic Ulcer Disease (2), and others like body pains, coryza, back pain, cephalgia, migraine, cluster headaches, urinary tract infection, etc.

Cases beyond the capacity of the clinic (chronic HTN unresponsive to drugs, grade 3 hemorrhoids, scrotal laceration, Degenerative spine disease etc) were referred to the patients hospital of choice.

We had an interesting case of Resistant Malaria in a patient who had treated malaria twice already within 3 weeks, but still very sick. The plan to assist with a more detailed diagnosis for a more effective treatment was thwarted by the patient's abscondment from the clinic. She was to do BF for MP, Malaria parasite count and typing, PBF, for which we had a phone conversation with the lab scientist who promised to help as a family friend. We equally admitted an 9-yr old HBSS in bone pain crisis for about 6hrs for bed rest, analgesics, ORS rehydration and observation. An Itikaaf participant, Dr Abosede Adabale, a Consultant Haematologist who is a relation of the patient was actively involved in the care of the HBSS patient as a specialist.

There were no emergencies beyond our capacity and we didn't have to move any of the patients to any hospital. No one had his or her I'tikaaf interrupted due to ill health as we had enough medications and varieties to attend to them.

The clinic was closed formally for the year around 9p.m. on March 29, 2025, after the sighting of the new moon.

## ZAKAT-UL-FITR

A total of N2,448,000 was paid in as Zakat-ul-Fitr, while some foodstuffs were also brought in for the same purpose. All the monies received were disbursed to needy Muslims, while the foodstuffs were also shared out to them. Alhaja Muinat Shopeyin, Alhaji AbdRazak Lawal and Imam Ridwan Jamiu were in charge of the disbursement of the money and sharing of the foodstuffs. The distribution of the Zakat-ul-fitr was not limited to LEMU, as it was shared to people in other Muslim communities far and near.

## DA'WAH PROGRAMMES

Apart from their solo acts of Ibadah, participants were inundated with beneficial Da'wah programmes during the Itikaaf. A Fiqh Forum, where Islamic and secular

issues were interrogated and elucidated, was held daily from 11a.m. to 1p.m. The Fiqh sessions were conducted by Imam Ridwan Jamiu and some external facilitators alternately. Dr. Liad Tiamiyu who manned the clinic was also given two slots to address health related issues.

Imam Ridwan Jamiu also held Tafsir-ul-Qur'an sessions from 5p.m. to 6.30p.m. daily, for the Itikaaf participants. Soul-moving Tarahwi and Tahajud prayers were also held throughout the Itikaaf.

## SECURITY

The security personnel deployed during Ramadan consisted of policemen, neighbourhood watch operatives, JIBWIS guards (Hagajis) and volunteers. Constant patrolling by selected security personnel ensured the security of the mosque and its surroundings throughout the Ramadan period.

The service point for the feeding of the less-privileged was so well-coordinated by security personnel that we didn't have any major issues regarding this area.

The major challenge we had during the Itikaaf was the haphazard parking of cars by participants during the first night. However, the challenge was promptly surmounted as security guards politely enforced orderly parking.

Although three cases of theft were reported and security operation was disrupted on the first three days of Ramadan, the overall security activities were highly effective and successful.

## CONCLUSION

As widely acknowledged by observers, we had a sterling outing during the last Ramadan. Nonetheless, we shall, in the years ahead, continue to review our programmes and strategies with a view to achieving better performances.

## Introduction

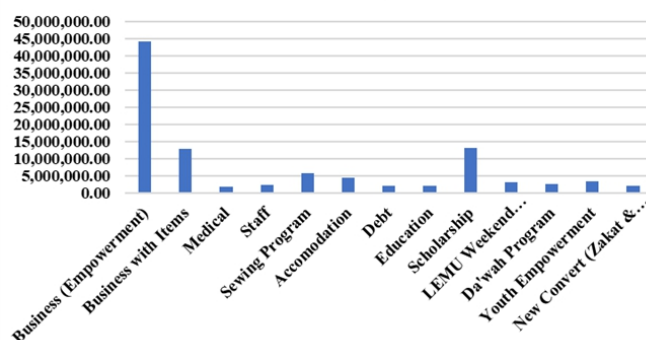
- ▶ Zakat and Sadaqa are very important for poverty alleviation, economic empowerment, emergency support for Islamic defense and Propagation.

- ▶ 2.5% is the Zakat payable when you have a savings that has reached Nisab, the value of 595 grams of silver (N1,071,000) – subject to change.

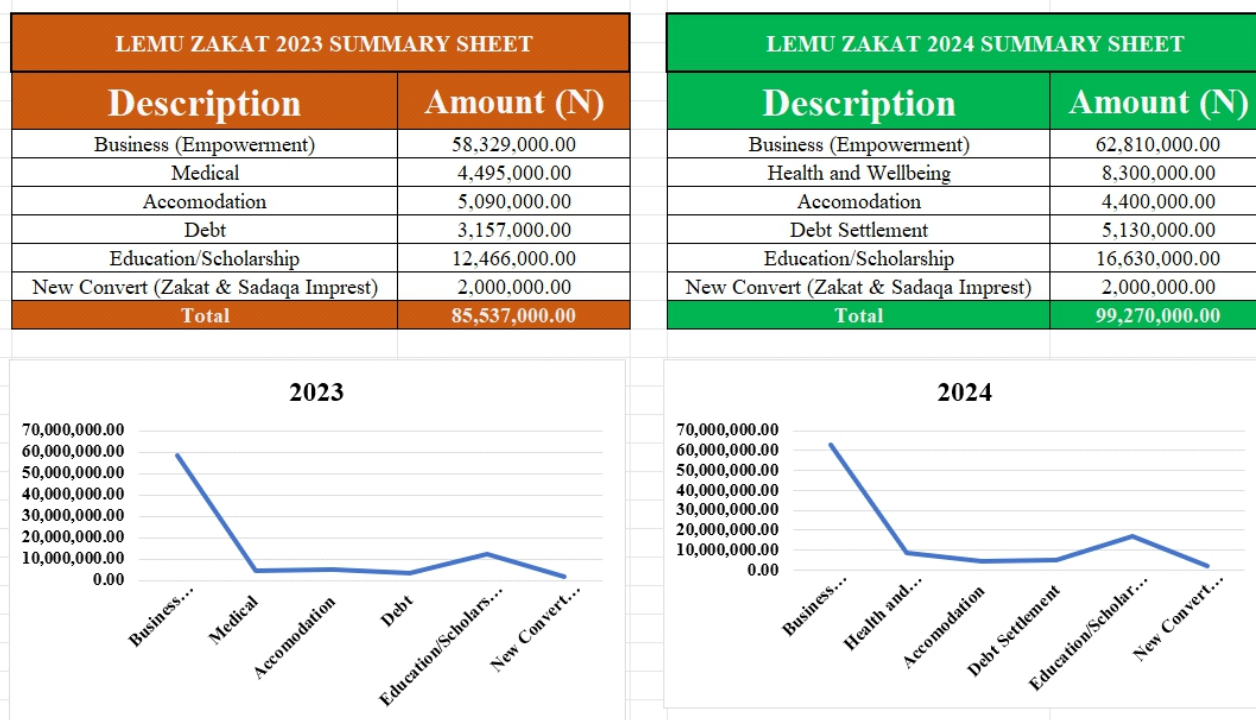
# Zakat Committee Report

## Some Zakat Activities

- ▶ One of the major focus of Zakat is to reduce poverty, support micro and small medium businesses thereby reducing crime rate in the society.
- ▶ N63M was spent to support different businesses. About 60% of the Zakat fund was allocated to this.
- ▶ Zakat Committee funded sewing program, a program designed to train youths on fashion skill. Previous beneficiaries from this program are now employers of labour. 5.2% of Zakat was spent on this.
- ▶ In 2024, we received so many reports whereby people are homeless. Over N4M was spent to support people to get accommodation.
- ▶ The economic realities was challenging, as a result, some people are in debt. The Committee supported the Ummah with over N2M to clear up their debt.
- ▶ The Committee supported some students from humble background with a Scholarship Program. This opportunity helps them with their education until graduation. In 2024, about N17M was spent on this program.
- ▶ 5 youths with a clear and convincing business plans were supported. About N3M was used to support them from Zakat fund.
- ▶ Almost every Friday, there are request seeking financial assistance, coupled with the new converts within the Masjid. N2M was allocated to cater for this expenses.
- ▶ 2.5% of Zakat allocation to Dawah Committee

- ▶ Upon their graduation, they will be supported with a brand new sowing machine

# Youth Committee Report

The 1446 AH calendar year was one of significant activity, learning, growth, and community service for the Youth Unit of Lekki Muslim Ummah (LEMU). This report provides a comprehensive overview of our programmes and engagements for the year, highlighting our commitment to spiritual development, community service, and Islamic brotherhood.

## 1. SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT AND RAMADAN PREPARATION

**Potluck Session – February 9, 2025**

**Topic: "Let's Guard Our Hearts: Ready for Ramadan"**

**March 8, 2025 –**

**Topic: "How to Love for Others What You Love for Yourself"**

This session unpacked the prophetic standard of empathy and mutual care, exploring how love for one's brother or sister in Islam is a sign of true faith.



**March 15, 2025 –**

**Topic: "Social Media and the Ethics of Brotherhood"**

Participants examined how Islamic values guide our digital interactions, addressing gossip, envy, and online etiquette in a hyperconnected age.

**March 22, 2025 –**

**Topic: "Economic Justice and Brotherhood in Islam"**

Focused on fairness in trade, equitable wealth distribution, and the role of financial support among Muslims. The session highlighted the economic dimensions of the Prophetic model of brotherhood.

**March 29, 2025 –**

**Topic: "The Link Between Faith and Selflessness"**

This final iftar session emphasised how sincere faith manifests through service, charity, and sacrifice for others, drawing on the lives of the Prophet (SAW) and his companions as examples.

## 3. EID INITIATIVES

**LEMU Eid Fair Goes to an Orphanage – March 31, 2025**

**Location: Children Centre, Idi-Araba, Lagos**

As part of our Eid al-Fitr outreach, the LEMU Youth Unit visited the Children Centre in Idi-Araba to celebrate Eid with orphans and vulnerable children. The team delivered food items, clothing, toys, and sweets, and spent the day engaging the children in activities and games.

## Eid Fest Lagos – Youth Collaboration

In collaboration with Muslim youth-led organisations, LEMU Youth participated in the Lagos Eid Fest, a large-scale event featuring halal entertainment, nasheed performances, youth networking, and post-Ramadan reflections.

### 4. BOOK DRIVE FOR YOUNG READERS

As part of our outreach efforts in 1446 AH, the LEMU Youth Unit launched a Book Drive aimed at sparking a lifelong love of reading among children aged 5 to 10 years old. The campaign called on members of the community to donate books that could inspire, educate, and entertain young minds in underserved environments.

Held at the Lekki Central Mosque from March 21st to 28th, between 11am and 4pm daily, the drive focused on collecting middle-grade novels, picture storybooks and school syllabus books suitable for early learners. The initiative was rooted in the belief that literacy is foundational to growth and empowerment.

### 5. COMMUNITY OUTREACH AND FUNDRAISING

#### N10 Million Fundraiser Campaign

In a bid to scale youth-led service and improve the welfare of vulnerable populations, the LEMU Youth Unit launched a ₦10 million fundraiser to support urgent infrastructure and rehabilitation needs at the Lagos Correctional Centre for Girls and the Special Correctional Centre for Girls.

The goal of the campaign is to provide a safe, dignified, and nurturing environment for the girls to focus on healing, personal growth, and education. Specific needs include:

- Installation of 20 new ceiling fans
- Reflooring of the main hall

- Replacement of damaged dormitory doors
- Provision of mattresses and a deep freezer for improved living conditions
- Renovation of key spaces such as the library, kitchen, bedrooms, and play area
- Installation of bookshelves and stocking of the library with children's books

These upgrades are intended to enhance both the physical environment and educational experience of the girls in residence.

As of the end of 1446 AH, over N1.5 million has been raised toward this target. We remain grateful to all supporters and look forward to sustaining the momentum in the coming year.

### 5. CONCLUSION AND OUTLOOK FOR 1447 AH

The LEMU Youth Unit remains deeply committed to nurturing a generation of spiritually grounded, socially responsible, and intellectually active young Muslims.

#### In the year ahead (1447 AH), we aim to:

- Improve mentorship opportunities and Islamic education programmes
- Expand our outreach efforts and community service initiatives
- Strengthen partnerships with other youth groups across Lagos and Nigeria

# LEMU Schools Report

## *In the Name of Allah, the Most Gracious, the Most Merciful*

It is with deep gratitude to Allah that I present this report on the activities and developments at

LEMU Schools for the 2024/2025 academic session. The session under review witnessed notable achievements in academic progress, infrastructural growth, staff welfare, and community engagement. It also marked the continuation of our unwavering commitment to delivering a balanced, value-driven education within an Islamic framework.

### 1. Infrastructure and Facilities

The construction of the third floor of the Lekki Qur'an Memorisation College (LQMC) was successfully completed during the session. Alhamdulillah, this expansion represents a significant milestone in our long-term development plan. Efforts are currently underway to equip and furnish this new space for use by the Secondary School section of LEMU Schools, with full commencement anticipated in September 2025, in shaa Allah.

The school's hostel facilities were also expanded to accommodate the growing number of secular Secondary school male boarders.

Additionally, the playground of Lekki Muslim Nursery and Primary School was renovated and refurbished through the generous contribution of the outgoing Chairman, Alhaji Mosediq Adeniji Kazeem SAN, whose support remains invaluable to the continued growth of the school.

A new school bus was also purchased during the session, courtesy of the Executives of LEMU and LEMU Schools. This will significantly ease the transportation of our learners and support logistics during external engagements.

### 2. Academic Growth and Quality Assurance

There was a commendable increase in the population of the Nursery, Primary, and Secondary School sections during the academic session. This growth reflects the rising confidence of parents and guardians in our educational offering and the strength of our holistic learning environment.

At the Lekki Qur'an Memorisation College, we were compelled to deny admission to over thirty applicants.

This decision was made to preserve the quality and integrity of our memorisation programme and to ensure each learner receives adequate attention and support.



To further strengthen the academic programme at LQMC, two external assessors—an experienced expert in Qur'an memorisation and a University Professor of Education—were engaged to critically evaluate the school's operations. Their recommendations were reviewed and promptly implemented, leading to improved academic delivery and overall structure.

The academic year began with staff development sessions for all LMS and LQMC teachers. These trainings were designed to align our educators with contemporary pedagogical approaches while reinforcing our Islamic values and mission.

### 3. Introduction of Pre-University Islamic Studies Course

A key highlight of the session was the successful launch of the Pre-University Islamic Studies Course. This initiative targets young adults who have completed their Secondary school education but lack the necessary grounding in Islam to practise it confidently and intellectually defend it.

Despite facing space constraints, we are pleased that the programme has commenced with strong interest and dedication. Plans are in place to expand the facility to accommodate more students in subsequent intakes, in shaa Allah.

## 4. School Activities and Events

## 5. Awards and Scholarships

We are proud to report that LMS students won prizes in four out of six categories at the 2024 School Reconnect Essay Competition, organised by Professor Azeez Butali, a distinguished honouree of former US President Joe Biden. This accomplishment is a testament to the quality of instruction, mentorship, and encouragement provided by our teachers.

Furthermore, a scholarship scheme was established during the session to support indigent students and promote educational inclusion. The fund is being sustained through the generous contributions of sponsors, including Mr Yemi Adeola and other well-meaning members of the community.

We remain grateful for their unwavering support and belief in our vision.

## 6. Staff Welfare and Remuneration

In recognition of the dedication and impact of our teaching and non-teaching staff, LEMU Schools approved

a series of salary increments during the session. These are summarised below:

- 30% / 40% increase for LMS staff – January 2025
- 20% / 25% increase for Tahfeez staff – January 2025
- 20% increase for Madrasah staff – January 2025
- 50% increase for Heads of LMS and Tahfeez – January 2025

These improvements have significantly boosted staff morale and retention, reinforcing our commitment to attracting and retaining quality educators.

## 7. Community Engagement and Leadership Transition

LEMU Schools, in conjunction with the Executives of Lekki Muslim Ummah, hosted a special dinner in honour of Alhaji Mosediq Adeniji Kazeem SAN, to celebrate his appointment as the National and Worldwide President of Ansar-ud-Deen Society of Nigeria.

The occasion also served to formally appreciate his exceptional service and leadership as Chairman of the Board of Governors of LEMU Schools. His tenure was marked by visionary direction, infrastructural development, academic progress, and financial stability.
